WHY FUND SOCIAL INNOVATION?

An end in itself?

To provide employment and harness social capital

A means to solving problems/overcoming challenges?

Locally, regionally, nationally and internationally

Spending public money on SI is justifiable if challenges are tackled

Therefore, seeding, growing <u>and</u> scaling are all important

Unless we use solutions developed to help solve problems the future of SI is in jeopardy

.....contd.

Creating mechanisms for SI involving public funds can help meet challenges and achieve policy objectives

But SI often seen as separate and not useful in public service agencies dealing with the key challenges

- Not helped by locating SI separately to key government departments dealing with challenges
- Not helped by social entrepreneurs and innovators promoting innovations without due regard to context

WHY A PUBLIC/PHIL FUND WORKS

Context: Re-focusing public budgets already under pressure is a big challenge because of e.g.:

- Existing legislation & regulations
- New policies to implement
- Quality Assurance recommendations e.g. in health and social services - often without commensurate increases in budget
- Pharmaceutical and technical developments
- Public/Customer/patient pressures
- Increasing needs allied to demographic trends and intake of migrants
- Tensions regarding trade-offs e.g. agriculture and climate change

Special purpose Public/Phil fund means:

- Current expenditure does not have to be re-diverted
- Opposition from vested interests is less likely
- Philanthropic element provides an impetus and helps keep it on track
- For the public system:
 - more cost-effective ways of meeting legislative responsibilities can be introduced
 - progress in achieving policy objectives is fast-tracked
- For Philanthropy:
 - catalyse sustainability and scaling
 - multiplying impact
- Avoids the need to pay back private investors at a future date

Combined public and philanthropy can attract private investment if needed/desired

KEY CONSIDERATIONS

- What interest exists to establish and implement a Public/Philanthropic fund?
- What will the specific objectives of the fund be?
 - seeding, growing and/or scaling innovation systemic change?
 - achieving regional and/or national objectives which ones?
 - furthering the missions of the philanthropist(s) involved?
- What funds might be available?
- What is an appropriate ratio of public to philanthropic funding?
- How many innovations might be seeded, grown or scaled?
- In what areas e.g. education, health, environment, transport etc.?

- Who might manage and administer funding?
- What capacity is available to evaluate and support innovations being funded to achieve targets?
- For potential applicants what will be worth the effort of applying and being monitored to implement and achieve agreed targets?
- How much attention will a pooled fund attract without creating too much resistance?
 - Too little money may not secure sufficient engagement
 - Too much money than can could jeopardize success
- Competition is well worth considering
- A careful, sequenced strategy is vital

WHAT ELSE IS NEEDED?

Non-financial support to seed, grow and scale innovations

Capacity to judge what is worth scaling

Service Reform Fund: Ireland

- €45m fund (€30m public +€15m philanthropy)
- Scaling innovation to national level
- Genio with Departments of Health & Housing, Health Service Executive, Local Authorities
 - Disability from institution to community living
 - Mental Health Individual Placement & Support
 - Homelessness Housing First

EUROPEAN SOCIAL CATALYST FUND

Public Philanthropic Fund (pilot)

EU Horizon Programme with Genio, Robert Bosch Foundation, King Baudouin Foundation

€600,000 – 7 planning grants selected e.g. in energy poverty, digital inclusion, elderly, migrants, employment,

Main objectives

- Find out if there are evidence-based successful social innovations with potential to scale - within and between member states
- Demonstrate the value of resourcing planning
- Design a bigger fund to support implementation of scaling



SCALING PLANS IN 15 COUNTRIES




